#### Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Children's Attention Home, Inc. (a nonprofit organization), which comprise the statements of financial position as of June 30, 2016 and 2015, and the related statements of activities and functional expenses, for the years then ended, the cash flow statement for the year ended June 30, 2016 and the related notes to the financial statements.

#### Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

#### Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. ### NOTE A - NATURE OF OPERATIONS AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

As a refuge for the rescued, the Children's Attention Home provides children with a place to call home and opportunities to succeed in life, while empowering them to shape their own futures and improve the world around them. The majority of referrals come through the Department of Social Services, and children may remain in the Children's Attention Home's care as long as needed. Up to 42 children can receive services at once. Emergency placement from city/county police departments may be accepted. The Department of Mental Health may refer a child in an effort to prevent foster care placement. These infrequent placements typically last no longer than five days. The Home is supported primarily through service contracts with the South Carolina Department of Social Services, the South Carolina Department of Health and Human Services, and by donor contributions. Approximately 56% and 53% of the Home's support for the years ended June 30, 2016 and June 30, 2015 respectively came from federal and state funding sources. The total dollar amount is contingent on federal and state allocations for services provided and may be changed due to changes in federal and state funding programs.

Grant revenues are recorded as they are earned, according to the provisions of the grant. Grant expenses are recognized when incurred for a grant related obligation.

The Children's Attention Home, Inc. provides services under fixed cost contracts for the South Carolina Department of Social Services and for the South Carolina Department of Health and Human Services. Under the arrangements, the Home contracts to provide certain services at a prescribed cost reimbursement, the Home would be expected to absorb the additional cost of providing the quantity of services contracted. Likewise, if the Home performs the services more efficiently than contracted for, the excess is available for future operating cost.

#### Contributed Services

During the year ended June 30, 2016, the value of contributed services meeting the requirements for recognition in the financial statements was not material and has not been recorded. In addition, many individuals volunteer their time and perform a variety of tasks that assist the Home, but these services do not meet the criteria for recognition as contributed services. The Home received more than 9,978 volunteer hours for the year ended June 30, 2016.

### NOTE A - NATURE OF OPERATIONS AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued):

#### Promises to Give

Contributions are recognized when the donor makes a promise to give to the Home that is, in substance, unconditional. Contributions that are restricted by the donor are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets if the restrictions expire in the fiscal year in which the contributions are recognized. All other donor-restricted contributions are reported as increases in temporarily or permanently restricted net assets depending on the nature of the restrictions. When restrictions expire, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets.

Annual Fund Raising Event, 'Heart of the Home' - Unconditional promises to give are not restricted. Requests are for unrestricted pledges and donations which allow Children's Attention Home to cover general operation expenses. Unconditional promises to give due in more than one year are reflected at their estimated present value less discount. The pledges are reviewed quarterly to determine the probable collection. Any deemed uncollectible are written off to bad pledges.

#### Accounts Receivable Valuation

Trade accounts receivable are reported at the amount management expects to collect from outstanding balances. Differences between the amount due and the amount management expects to collect are reported in the results of operations of the year in which those differences are determined, with an off-setting entry to a valuation allowance for trade accounts receivable. Balances that are still outstanding after management has used reasonable collection efforts are written off through a charge to the valuation allowance and a credit to trade accounts receivable. Accounts receivable consists of the amounts described in Note B and are considered by management to be fully collectible.

#### Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

### NOTE A - NATURE OF OPERATIONS AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued):

#### Compensated Absences

Employees of the Home are entitled to annual leave, depending on the length of service. The Home has recognized the cost of compensated absences at June 30, 2016 to be \$34,818.

#### Property and Equipment

Purchased property and equipment is capitalized at cost. Donation of property and equipment are recorded at their estimated fair value. Such donations are reported as unrestricted contributions unless the donor has restricted the donated asset to a specific purpose. Assets donated with explicit restrictions regarding their use and contributions of cash that must be used to acquire property and equipment are reported as restricted contributions. Absent donor stipulations regarding how long those donated assets must be maintained, the Home reports expirations of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired assets are placed in service as instructed by the donor. The Home reclassifies temporarily restricted net assets at that time. Property and equipment are depreciated using the straight-line and accelerated methods over the estimated useful life of the related assets. Repairs and maintenance are charged to expense as incurred. Until fully operational, buildings and related development costs for new group housing are capitalized and shown separately under constructions in progress. Estimated useful lives of the assets generally are as follows:

#### Financial Statement Presentation

As required by FASB Accounting Standards Codification 958, "Not for Profit Entities", the Organization is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets. As permitted by the statement, the Home does not use fund accounting.

#### Contributions

As required by FASB Accounting Standards Codification 958, "Not for Profit Entities". Contributions received are recorded as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted support depending on the existence or nature of any donor restrictions.

### NOTE A - NATURE OF OPERATIONS AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued):

#### Cash, Cash Equivalents and Concentration of Credit Risk

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, the Home considers all highly liquid investments available for current use with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents. The Home maintains its cash on deposits accounts, which at times exceed the federally insured limits of \$250,000. The Home has not experienced any losses in such accounts. The Home did not exceed the NCUA insurance level in any of its bank accounts at June 30, 2016.

#### **Income Taxes**

The Children's Attention Home is a not-for-profit organization exempt from Federal income tax under section 501(c) (3) of the United States Internal Revenue Code as a charitable organization.

The Children's Attention Home income tax returns are subject to review and examination by federal and state authorities. The Children's Attention Home is not aware of any activities that would jeopardize its tax-exempt status. The fiscal year 2013, 2014, and 2015 returns are open for examination by federal and state taxing authorities.

#### NOTE E - RESTRICTIONS ON NET ASSETS

Total Fixed Assets

Substantially all of the restrictions/board designations on net assets at June 30, 2016 were related to funds established for Capital Projects, Endowment, Programs and Operating Reserves. Capital Project funds are board designated for expansion and improvements to existing facilities and long lived assets. Endowment assets are permanently restricted with earnings and residuals used for long term sustainment of the operation. Program funds are temporarily restricted, generally by the grantor or donor, for use within one year for specific programs. Operating reserves were established at the Board of Directors direction which designates the use of funds in the event of operating deficits. Restricted net assets at June 30, 2016 are made up of permanently restricted net assets of \$359,734 and are held in the Legacy Fund and temporarily restricted net assets of grantor restricted funds of \$14,261. Board designated net assets, which are unrestricted in nature totaled \$784,695 which consists of investment for capital of \$385,081, operating reserve of \$385,353.

#### NOTE F - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

In 2003, the Board of Directors of Children's Attention Home, Inc. adopted a resolution that provides for the establishment of a separate nonprofit entity, Palmetto School at the Children's Attention Home, a Charter School. Abused, abandoned, and/or neglected children in the Children's Attention Home, Inc.'s care as well as children residing in local homeless and/or women's shelters are eligible to attend the charter school. The accounts and transactions of the "Charter School" are not included in the accompanying financial statements.

Children's Attention Home has signed a lease agreement with the Palmetto School for monthly rent payments of \$2,000. These rents will be used in general operations expenses of the Children's Attention Home. Rents received in 2016 were \$24,000.

#### NOTE G - SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

The Children's Attention Home has considered subsequent events through October 31, 2016 the date of the issuance, in preparing the financial statements and notes hereto.

#### **NOTE H - INVESTMENTS**

Children's Attention Home has established a long-term investment strategy. Funds are invested with the Foundation for the Carolinas. These funds are to be used for capital expenditures, operations and permanently restricted legacy contributions. The legacy fund is permanently restricted from any disbursements of principal balance however the earnings on the account may be used for general operations. The Capital Fund is temporarily restricted to capital maintenance and repair of long term assets and expansion of the Children Attention Home campus including land purchase, development and construction of additional children's residential care facilities. The operations fund is not restricted but instead a rainy day fund for the future operations of the home.

We have audited The Children's Attention Home, Inc.'s compliance with the types of compliance requirements described in the *OMB Compliance Supplement* that could have a direct and material effect on each of The Children's Attention Home's major federal programs for the year ended June 30, 2016. The Children's Attention Home's major federal programs are identified in the summary of auditor's results section of the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs.

#### Management's Responsibility

Management is responsible for compliance with federal statutes, regulations, and the terms and conditions of its federal awards applicable to its federal programs.

#### Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on compliance for each of The Children's Attention Home, Inc.'s major federal programs based on our audit of the types of compliance requirements referred to above. We conducted our audit of compliance in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America; the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States; and the audit requirements of Title 2 U.S. code of Federal Regulations Part 200, *Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards*. (Uniform Guidance) Those standards and the Uniform Guidance require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether noncompliance with the types of compliance requirements referred to above that could have a direct and material effect on a major federal program occurred. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence about The Children's Attention Home's compliance with those requirements and performing such other procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion on compliance for each major federal program. However, our audit does not provide a legal determination of The Children's Attention Home, Inc.'s compliance.

#### Opinion on Each Major Federal Program

In our opinion, The Children's Attention Home, Inc. complied, in all material respects, with the types of compliance requirements referred to above that could have a direct and material effect on each of its major federal programs for the year ended June 30, 2016.

#### Report on Internal Control Over Compliance

Management of The Children's Attention Home, Inc.is responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal control over compliance with the types of compliance requirements referred to above. In planning and performing our audit of compliance, we considered The Children's Attention Home, Inc.'s internal control over compliance with the types of requirements that could have a direct and material effect on each major federal program to determine the auditing procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing an opinion on compliance for each major federal program and to test and report on internal control over compliance in accordance with the Uniform Guidance, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of internal control over compliance. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of The Children's Attention Home's internal control over compliance.

A deficiency in internal control over compliance exists when the design or operation of a control over compliance does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, noncompliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program on a timely basis. A material weakness in internal control over compliance is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control over compliance, such that there is a reasonable possibility that material noncompliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program will not be prevented, or detected and corrected, on a timely basis. A significant deficiency in internal control over compliance is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control over compliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program that is less severe than a material weakness in internal control over compliance, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control over compliance was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control over compliance that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. We did not identify any deficiencies in internal control over compliance that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified.

The purpose of this report on internal control over compliance is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over compliance and the results of that testing based on the requirements of the Uniform Guidance. Accordingly, this report is not suitable for any other purpose.
