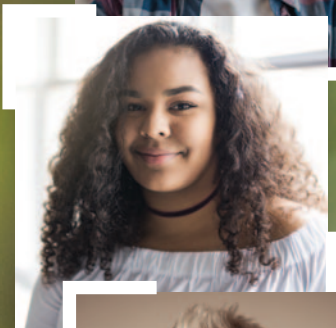

## Meeting THE NEED

**Before coming to the Home, Charisma struggled with school and her health.** Charisma needed help managing her diabetes and staying on track in virtual school, and her foster home was not equipped to help. Charisma first came to the Home's Day Services program. Here, the team was able to support her in school during the day and help her manage her blood sugar. After two months, a place opened up in the Home's enhanced care program, and Charisma came to live at the Home full time. Charisma went from two hospital visits a week to none, was connected with the right medical care, and began a GED program. She is working on learning to live independently and is preparing to enter the workforce in the next couple of months. When asked about her time at the Home, Charisma shared:

**Last year, 21 youth were placed on a waitlist to enter the Home's residential program to receive enhanced care services.**

## Come & BELONG

### **Rex was in a tough spot.**

After multiple failed placements and four months in psychiatric residential care, he struggled to trust anyone. As a transgender youth, Rex was learning to accept himself, but finding a place that both met his needs and welcomed him was a challenge. Rex came to the Home reluctant to receive help after all he'd experienced. Over time, the team at the Home worked with Rex to build trust and set short and long-term goals. He was connected with a therapist for his mental health needs and enrolled in a GED program, which he completed in just two weeks! Rex obtained his driving permit, began working, opened a bank account, and saved over \$1,000 in just 3 months. Because of the opportunities afforded him at the Home, Rex was able to make tremendous strides towards a healthier life. When asked about his time at the Home, Rex shared:

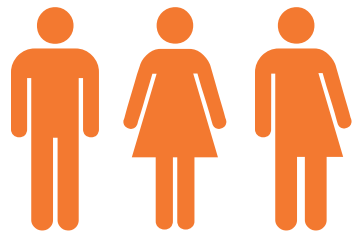

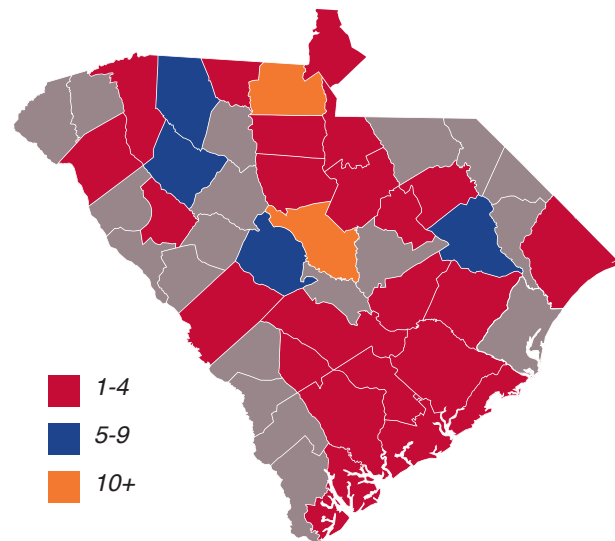

## Treating THE TRAUMA

**Danielle stayed in 14 different places prior to coming to live at the Home.**

After so many new places, Danielle was reluctant to form relationships. Using trauma-informed care methods, our team worked to find activities that connected with Danielle. Over time, they discovered Danielle's love for art and journaling. To help her progress, the team often worked with Danielle one-on-one to help her accomplish goals and develop her coping skills. They also worked closely with her caseworker to ensure Danielle had the resources and daily support she needed through ups and downs. To help her be successful in school, a modified educational plan was developed and Danielle began attending half days. The Home was also able to connect Danielle with art camps and local community events that showcased her talent. Danielle began to blossom and shine thanks to the team of people who walked with her daily in her journey towards progress. When asked about her time at the Home, Danielle shared:

**Of the 3,223 training hours our staff completed last year, 1,052 training hours were specific to trauma-informed practices.**

## Providing STABILITY

**Marisol came to the Home in 2021.** Her previous foster home was not able to provide the care she needed, and after two stays in the hospital for self-harm and suicidal ideation, she came to live at the Home. First in moderate care, she asked to be moved to a more therapeutic setting to help address her complex mental health needs. She transitioned to the Home's Enhanced Care cottage, where she stayed for a year. In this program, she received more intensive counseling, was paired with a mentor, and began working for a supportive employer to work on independent living goals. To reduce her anxiety with school, Marisol transitioned to virtual school. After two years, Marisol completed all of her goals and moved to the Transitional Care cottage. She is set to graduate school a year early, has maintained employment for a year, and is set to start a full-time job next semester. When asked about her time at the Home, Marisol shared:

“It truly has been an experience.”

Every night, youth without a long-term place to stay are shuffled to different place each night and spending days in offices. Our newest program launched July 2023 to provide these children individualized attention and care and meet their most basic and immediate needs during the day.

**In 2023, the program cared for 40 youth waiting for placement.**

# Defining SUCCESS

**We are often asked, "How would you define success for the children living at the Home?"**

**Success looks different for each young person we serve.** Sometimes success looks like a graduate in their cap and gown. Sometimes it looks like a teen taking a walk when they are upset and coping in a healthy way.

When a teen arrives at the Home, our team spends the first two weeks getting to know them, doing assessments, and understanding their strengths and needs. From this information, they work with every youth to develop their comprehensive care plan, including identifying their goals.

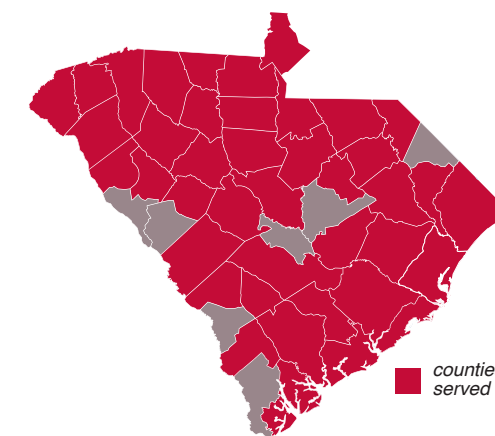
**Take Malaysia\*, whose care plan you see to the side.** After living in 16 different places over 7 years and no desire to return home, she struggles to pinpoint her feelings and communicate her emotions, and she uses self-harm to cope with her pain. She is also artistic and creative, wants to finish school, and successfully live on her own. How does her path to success look different than other teen girls you may know?

For over 50 years, the Home has cared for youth experiencing abuse, neglect, and homelessness. But over time, the needs have changed. Today, more children are entering care with higher degrees of trauma and more complex needs. At the same time, the number of suitable foster care placements continue to shrink.

To meet these significant needs in our community and across the state, the Home has expanded its scope of residential services and added the Day Services Program to fill critical gaps in care. As one of the few agencies providing this wide array of support, the Home has served youth from 39 of the 46 counties in South Carolina since 2019.

**These tailored services make it possible for the Home to meet more youth where they are,** provide higher quality care, and prevent more youth from having to move when their needs change. In Malaysia's case, she was received the specific care she needed as she grew and developed without have to uproot again and adjust to yet another new placement.

Providing a safe home, trustworthy and compassionate adults who care, and helping youth see their worth are cornerstones to their long-term success. With more tools to the proverbial toolbox, the Home can equip more youth on their path to success.

**In the last four years, 12 young adults have returned back to the Home for services and care.**

## Standing IN THE GAP

**Bryant lived at the Home for a year and a half before reuniting with his father at age 16.** However, shortly after returning home, Bryant's father struggled to make sure Bryant received the care he needed. To help out at home, Bryant got a job to help pay the bills, and his grades slipped from As and Bs to Ds. To cope with everything, Bryan often resorted to substance use. After working diligently to make ends meet, Bryant reached out for help and came to live at the Home again through the Crossroads program. Since returning, Bryant has received medical and mental health services to process the trauma he has experienced and practice healthy coping skills. He improved his grades, is on track to graduate in June, and is enrolled in certification courses for electricity and construction to pursue his career after school. Bryant has also been able to secure a job, obtain his driver's permit, and open a bank account. When asked about his time at the Home, Bryant shared:

**“ I was glad the Home was there when I needed it the most. ”**

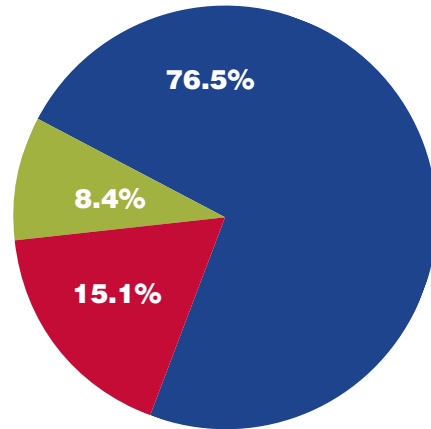

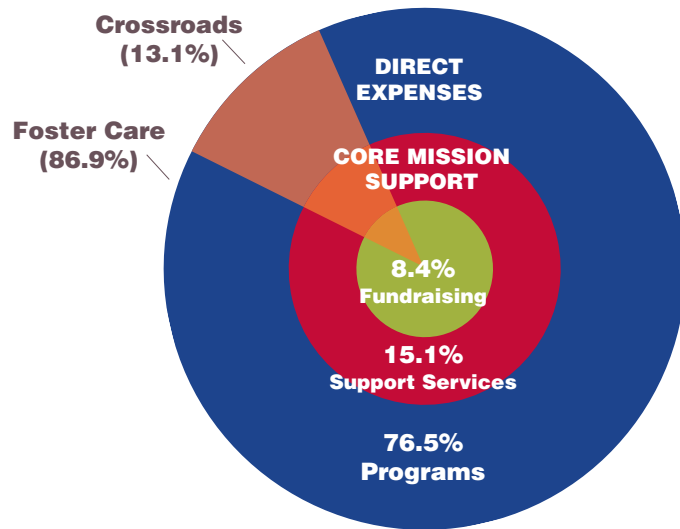

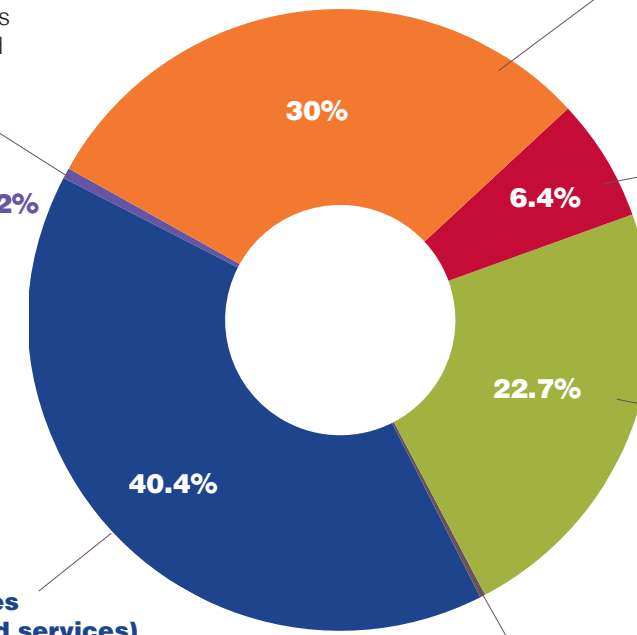

In total, 50.67% of all income is provided through federal allocations that pass-through state agencies, state assistance, and county clothing reimbursements, 49.00% is provided through individual and corporate donations, foundation grants, United Way, gifts in-kind, and income from special events, and 0.33% is miscellaneous revenue.
